The winter rains are still pouring in, puddling in abandoned garden beds that once held colorful annuals. The shrubs and fruit trees are pruned back and bare, patiently waiting for warmer days. As the hidden seeds in the ground take root and prepare for blooming, the world invites us to be observant and patient, while we participate in the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection.

This year, we will unlock/experience/perceive these mysteries in a new way, by encountering God and Christ through the symbol/allegory of Gardens. From the moment Adam and Eve were expelled from the Garden of Eden, God lamented the separation between himself and humanity. He longed to walk alongside us, to share in our joys and sorrows, but sin created a chasm that seemed impossible to bridge.

However, through Jesus' death and resurrection, that bridge was miraculously constructed. Jesus' resurrection was not just a restoration of physical life; it was the opening of a new reality, where humanity could once again dwell in the presence of God. The resurrection was the fulfillment of God's longing to be with us, to invite us back into the Garden, to restore the intimacy that was lost. This profound mystery is what we celebrate during Lent and Easter. It is not just a time to remember Jesus' sacrifice, but an opportunity to enter into the narrative of God's redemptive love.



SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 18

Sermon: "Creator and Gardener"

The story of Jesus's death and resurrection begins at the very beginning, with God the Creator walking the Garden of Eden with Adam and Eve.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 25

Sermon: "Cast Out of the Garden"

We once walked alongside God in the Garden, but sin now separates us from God and each other. This is not how it was meant to be. Can we ever return to what once was?

Communion

Sermon: "Tilling Wilderness into a Garden"

Our sin separates us from God, creates a wilderness in our hearts, and condemns us to death. Is it possible for God to turn graves into aardens?

Hear how scripture describes God as a gardener and how it prepares us for the story of redemption through Jesus Christ.

Sometimes when we meet Jesus we find a totally unexpected experience. The Jesus we seek is often not the Jesus we find.

SUNDAY, MARCH 24

Palm Sunday

Sermon: "A Path of Palms"

The palms we burned to remember our sin and mortality on Ash Wednesday are seen again on Palm Sunday lining the path of Christ Jesus. The duality and paradox of joy and sorrow befit the season as we come closer to Easter.

SUNDAY. MARCH 31

Easter

Sermon: "The Gardner at the Grave"

Witness the transformation God gifts us when graves are turned into gardens, where sorrow blooms into joy, as the resurrected Jesus greets Mary, who mistakes him for a Gardener.

SUNDAY, APRIL 7

First Sunday after Easter Communion

Sermon: "Back to the Garden of Eden"

Jesus's resurrection is a promise of redemption and a pathway back to the Garden where God dwells, a new one, where there are no tears, sorrow, or pain. We end our series in Revelation, where God the Gardener greets us in our own final victory through Jesus Christ.

Drop-In Imposition of Ashes:

Start your Ash Wednesday with the devotional practice of receiving ashes during our drop-in time in the Sanctuary. Pastor Karen will be available to impose ashes and offer a prayer if you desire. Please use the Welcome Center entrance. Parents dropping off children at the childcare center are invited to bring their children for either ashes on their forehead or a stamp on their hand.

Ash Wednesday Service:

Somber music, sermon, and imposition of ashes make this Ash Wednesday service a meaningful experience to start the Lenten season.



PALM SUNDAY

Sunday, March 24 10:40 am
Narthex

On Palm Sunday, we invite children and youth to participate in worship by parading palms during the Processional Hymn. Arrive in the narthex (Sanctuary lobby) and your child/youth will receive a palm with which to process down the aisle during the opening hymn of worship.

They will drop the palms off at the altar kneelers and return to their seat. Parents are welcome to join the children in the processional.



MAUNDY THURSDAY SERVICE

Thursday, March 28 7:00 pm Sanctuary

Before we can celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday, we must participate in his last moments on Maundy Thursday. Join us for this somber service, recalling the days leading up to Christ's sacrifice on the cross. You do not want to miss this important mid-week service as we prepare for Easter.



GOOD FRIDAY PRAYER VIGIL

Friday, March 29 11:30 am - 1:00 pm (Drop-in) Sanctuary

Good Friday marks the day on which the crucifixion of Jesus is remembered. It gives us a powerful message and a demonstration of God's unconditional love for all of us. Our sanctuary will be open from 11:30 am - 1:00 pm for prayer and reflection. We invite you to stop by during your lunch hour, as you are able. Please enter through the Welcome Center.

Observance of Lent is a journey of preparation for following Jesus. The word Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten," meaning lengthen and referring to the lengthening days of spring. As United Methodists, we observe Lent beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending on Holy Saturday. During these forty days (not counting Sundays) we are asked to spend time in reflection, repentance, fasting, and caring for others. Sundays are not counted in the forty days because disciples are celebrating the resurrection of Jesus through intentional devotional practices already, and they are sometimes called "mini-Easters."

SHROVE TUESDAY

The day before Lent is called Shrove Tuesday, which comes from the word "shrive," meaning presenting one's self for absolution of sins after confession as a way to prepare for the season ahead. Another preparation was to rid the household of rich foods, such as eggs, milk, and sugar, since plainer foods were eaten during Lent as part of a fast. An easy way to use up these specific ingredients was to make a batch of pancakes. Although United Methodists typically do not have have strict observances on Shrove Tuesday, we have held onto the tradition of eating pancakes together as a fellowship meal.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday marks the start of the season of Lent and the beginning of our Lenten discipleship practices. In the Ash Wednesday service, we come before God recognizing our humanity, repenting of our sin, and remembering who we are and who we can be. Ashes are imposed on a person's forehead in the shape of a cross by a pastor. The use of ashes demonstrates an awareness of mortality and an intent to repent. Traditionally, the ashes used are created from the palm branches of the previous year's Palm Sunday service.



PALM SUNDAY

Palms throughout history have been used to welcome kings by placing palms branches on the ground for him to walk or ride on as a sign of victory. When Jesus entered the gates of Jerusalem for Passover, he was welcomed with palm branches like a king returning to his city. But Jesus overturned expectations of a militant messiah or a conquering king, as he came into the city riding a humble donkey, bringing words of peace and the promise of eternal life. In observance of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, churches will use palm branches as decorations and will have children process with palms as part of the worship service.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is the first of the three days of solemn remembrance of the events leading up to and immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. Maundy comes from the Latin word "mandatum," which is mandate. In Jesus's final moments before his arrest, he humbly washes the feet of his disciples and has a final meal with them, thus instituting the Lord's Supper. As they partake in the meal, Jesus gives them the mandate: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another" (John 13:34-35). The Maundy Thursday is a somber service, rich with scripture, ritual, and Communion, leading us up to the cross where Jesus died for our sins.

GOOD FRIDAY

The Friday before Easter on which the crucifixion of Jesus is remembered is called Good Friday ("good" being an old church expression meaning holy). It is a solemn and mournful day of reflection and prayer, as we reflect on our sinfulness and the lengths God takes to redeem us, including death on the cross.

EASTER SUNDAY

Jesus died and was buried in a tomb hewn of stone, but on the third day he rose from the dead and claims victory over Death itself. He promises to us that we too will be resurrected with him and be restored to God's eternal kingdom. Easter is an exuberant day as we sing "Alleluias" and shout "Christ is risen! Christ is risen, indeed!"

Worship Practices



THE TRAVELING CROSS

Throughout the season of Lent at Open Hearts UMC, you will find a gnarled and twisted cross about five feet high, parked among the pews. The cross will be relocated every week, giving the appearance that it is traveling. There may be some Sundays when you come to worship and the cross is in "your spot" or in your way. It is a reminder to all that we must view our lives through the lens of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, knowing we might need to shift our perspective.



VEILING THE CROSS

The brass cross on the altar will be veiled with a sheer fabric. The veil covering the cross offers an outward and visible symbol of the penitential nature of the season of Lent. The veil obscures our vision of the cross that shapes our worship and in doing so reminds us that our sinful nature can obscure our vision of God.

STRIPPING THE ALTAR

A ritual that is done on Maundy Thursday is "stripping the altar" by removing the brass candlesticks, the cross, paschal candle, and paraments (linens and cloth hangings used on Communion tables, altars, pulpits and lecterns). Stripping of the altar symbolizes the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and the stripping of Jesus by the soldiers before his crucifixion. Following Communion during the Maundy Thursday service, the pastor and lay members will strip the altar and veil it in black cloth.

FLOWERING OF THE CROSS

The barren cross of Good Friday comes alive again on Easter Sunday with flowers that symbolize the new life that emerges with Jesus' death and resurrection. Congregation and community members are invited to bring flowers from their homes to decorate the living cross at the front entrance of the Sanctuary. There will be additional flowers to decorate the cross provided by Open Hearts UMC for those who cannot bring their own.



ABSTAINING FROM ALLELUIAS

One practice that congregations or individuals may adopt during Lent is to abstain from saying "alleluia/hallelujah" as a way of bringing solemnity to the season as well as exuberance on Easter, when we allow ourselves to say it again. "Such a practice can be a kind of fasting from "ecstasy" and ecstatic praise, as the hallelujahs lie dormant for six weeks before we again burst out in joyful and ecstatic affirmation of the Resurrection" (resourceumc.org).



PRAYERS AT THE ALTAR

The altar rail is open during the closing hymn for anyone who wants to spend time kneeling in prayer. If you would like someone to pray with or for you, a member of the Prayer Team will join you at the altar rail. As always, you

may send the Pastor and Prayer Team your requests for prayer by dropping off a prayer card in the offering plate or prayer box near the office, or you may email us at CARES@openheartsumcsc.org.







FASTING

Fasting is a practice of abstaining from eating for a certain period of time as an act of devotion. If your health allows, consider choosing one day a week where you will skip a meal, only consuming liquids. When you feel hungry during that time, stop and pray for the world, church, and yourself. You may also consider donating the money you would have used on that meal towards a meaningful charity. You may also consider abstaining from a favorite food, hobby, leisurely activity, guilty pleasure, or convenience. For example, some people have fasted from chocolate, video games, golfing, alcohol, meat, social media, television, or going to the movies. Whatever it is that you are fasting from, fill that void with prayer, scripture, and other acts of devotion to draw yourself closer to God.

TAKING ON A NEW PRACTICE

Instead of giving something up for Lent, you may want to consider "taking something on" as a new devotional practice. Here are a few ways you can add to your day as a way of drawing closer to God.

- Add more prayer time to your day.
- Start a prayer journal, documenting what you are praying for and how God answers your prayers.
- · Commit to a random act of kindness each day of Lent.
- · Read a devotional book.





PALMS

Palms represent triumph and victory. The palm branches that are used on Palm Sunday to celebrate Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem before his death are then dried, burned, and ground into ash to be used for Ash Wednesday service the next year. The same palms used to celebrate Jesus are used to remind us of our own death, which in turn reminds us that through Christ we will be given victory over death when we are resurrected with him.



LILIES

Lilies are the traditional flower for Easter because they are shaped like a trumpet, reminding us of herald trumpets that announce the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and the trumpets of heaven.

PURPLE

Purple is a color used in the church to represent penitence and invites worshippers to be solemn and remorseful. It is also the color of royalty and represents the sovereignty of Jesus Christ. During Lent, the paraments (the tapestries on the altar, pulpit, and lectern) will be purple.

BLACK

On Maundy Thursday, the chancel will be stripped bare of paraments and brass appointments to represent the stripping of Jesus Christ during his Passion. The altar, pulpit, lectern, and baptismal font are items that are too difficult to remove so they will be covered in black to hide them, just as Christ was hidden from us in the grave. The black clothes will remain for three days, representing the three days Jesus was in the grave, until midnight on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter).

WHITE

The color white is used on the holiest of days in the church. After a long season of purple paraments in Lent, followed by three barren days of black, the color white makes a glorious appearance on Easter Sunday in joyful celebration of Christ's resurrection.



NURSERY

Nursery is available during Sunday School and worship for children ages 0 to 3 years old in Room B-04.



CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

We want children to learn how to worship God too, so we have broken down worship in a way that is inviting to our littlest disciples. We have **Children's Worship Activities** in the narthex (lobby) and in front of the church behind the organ. We also have a special **Children's Message** built into the worship service so children can receive God's word too. Children of any age can come up to the message, and their adults can join them if it makes them more comfortable.

CHILDREN'S CHURCH

After the Children's Message in worship, a volunteer will shepherd the children to the Children's Classroom (D-o4), where they were hear a Bible story and do a related craft together with our caring volunteers.

COMM[UNITY] COFFEE (TRINITY HALL)

Free coffee is available during the Sunday School hour. On Easter Sunday, we will have a light breakfast and juice in addition to coffee.

NURSERY (ROOM B-04)

Nursery is available for children up to age three years old.



CHILDREN'S CLASS (ROOM D-04)

Children in 4K through 5th grade are taught from Cokesbury's Celebrate Wonder curriculum, which "engages children's natural sense of curiosity to help them understand God's love. It creates a safe environment for kids to ask big questions — helping them explore the Bible in ways that feed their imagination and encourage creativity."

YOUTH CLASS (ROOM D-05)

We want our youth to have a sense of ownership in our church. Alongside some generous volunteers, our youth have helped decorate and create their Sunday school classroom. Sunday mornings youth will have the opportunity to gather with adult volunteers to explore their faith. Throughout the season of Lent and through Holy Week we will be exploring the worship series "Depths of Love."





FRIENDSHIP CLASS (ROOM A-09)

The Friendship class is primarily composed of retirees and empty-nesters who study and discuss a variety of biblical topics led by rotating class members.

OPEN HEARTS CLASS (ROOM C-13)

The Open Hearts class is a mission-focused intergenerational class promoting engaged learning through a variety of skilled teachers offering primarily discussion-based lessons. They are partnering with Triune Mercy Center and United Ministries for their service projects.

They are currently studying Methodism throughout the season of Lent.

NEW ADULT CLASS (ROOM D-04)

Our newest adult Sunday school class is an intergenerational class that is focused on acts of service. They are currently enjoying building community together through conversations and helpful projects around the church on Sunday mornings.
